A NOTE FROM OUR CHAIRMAN

Dear Speckle Park Community,

Happy New Year! I hope you all had a wonderful Christmas and enjoyed some down time (to the extent that is possible with livestock!) to prepare for another big year.

It has been great to see much needed rainfall falling across large parts of the Country. The cattle market opened significantly stronger than it closed with the Eastern Young Cattle Indicator reaching 616.35c/kg last week, with improved conditions driving demand by restockers. With Speckle Park stud sale calendar commencing shortly, we expect to see the more buoyant outlook translate to improved results.

As mentioned in the December Board Report, we have engaged the services of Graham Truscott, former CEO of Angus Australia and the Australian Wagyu Association to conduct a review and make recommendations on the next phase of growth, including operational and strategic direction. We are excited by the opportunity to draw upon Graham's wealth of experience that has been so pivotal to the advancement and success of great beef breeds in Australia. The Board of Directors will be meeting in Armidale next month, together with Graham, to participate in a strategic planning workshop. SPI extends its thanks to those members who have submitted information via the Data Warehouse. This data is an invaluable resource for our Technical and Marketing Sub-Committees. If you have suitable data to provide, it is gratefully accepted via the Data Warehouse link at the bottom of the Forms and Resources page on the website also.

As a supporting partner of Beef24, plans are well underway to ensure SPI maximises the marketing and networking opportunities afforded by this important event in the industry's calendar. There will be various ways in which members can get involved and represent Speckle Park at this event - stay tuned for further details in this regard.

Members will have received an email on Friday, 19 January 2024 attaching a pre-list of current registered females. You have until 29 February 2024 to update your list to ensure your inventory fees are invoiced accurately. You can complete this process manually by filling in the list emailed to you however, we encourage members to update your female inventory electronically via ILROnline - this can be done via the Animals/Performance Overview tab. Your inventory can by kept up to date all year round using this method. If you need your log in details for ILROnline or have any queries about using the system, please reach out to our MSO, Heather, by phone or email.

As you finalise your plans for the year ahead, we urge you to consider whether you have any capacity to join one of our volunteer Sub-Committees. Not only are they a fantastic opportunity to provide a valued contribution to the Speckle Park breed, but they are a great way to expand your knowledge and network by working closely with your peers. Starting a new stud can be a daunting task. Just one of many questions we see raised is 'how or what guidelines are there to name registered animals?'.

Important factors in naming your animals are understanding your Herd ID/Membership No. and Prefix. Your Herd ID/Membership No. is three characters or numerals that make a unique identifier to your herd. No two studs can have the same Herd ID/Membership No. or prefix.

A prefix is a unique name that prefixes all the animals that you breed. Every registered animal in the Speckle Park herdbook has a unique name which may be in different formats but will always commence with a prefix.

The registered name of an animal (including the prefix) must not exceed 29 characters.

All registered animals have a letter associated with the year they were born - this forms part of the animal identification. The letter associated with 2024 is 'V'. The letters I & O are not used due to the similarity to 0 & 1. Each animal is then given a number usually in the order of birth which is added to the Herd ID/Membership No. For example, the first animal born in 2024 will be V1 etc. This can also be formatted as V01 or V001 as per your stud's preference.

Now comes the hard part! How do you name them?

We have come up with some suggestions below. There is no right or wrong way of doing it, when starting your stud you only need decide which method best suits your operation.

- 1. Naming your females based on their dam's/family line. This will generally indicate to anyone who views this animal on the register/catalogue that your animal is descended from that particular cow line. For example, if you had a Unique 8R daughter, granddaughter etc etc, you could use this cow line as your name. For example 'ABC Speckles Unique V1'.
- 2. You could name your females/males with names beginning with the year letter that they are born in. For example, 'ABC Speckles Victor V1' or 'ABC Speckles Voluptuous V1'. This method indicates that these animals were born in a particular year.
- 3. You could name your females/males with any theme or name you believe suits the animal. For example, you may decide to name them all plant names or celebrity names etc. There is no right or wrong, it is just what suits your operation. You could then use that theme to carry on their name for future generations.

Further to the above, is how to incorporate the Sire into the equation. This could be by incorporating his Rego ID into the name. For example, if the sire of an animal is AAA Walker Frontline M24, you could then incorporate this into the name by using 'ABC Speckles M24 Unique V1'.

FROM RINGSIDE TO REGINA WITH EMILY EDWARDS

I have been fortunate enough to be able to take part in the South Australia Junior heifer expo for the last 7 years, with last year 2023, being my final year eligible to participate. I have thoroughly enjoyed the last 7 years that I have spent attending and competing in the expo and highly recommend it to all those in the industry. The expo has allowed me to make meaningful connections with many people within the industry, with highlights of my time participating being my time spent teaching and mentoring the juniors, taking my first purebred animal to the 2023 show as well as being fortunate enough to walk away as not only reserve senior judge but also reserve senior champion herdsperson last year. Achieving reserve senior champion herdsperson was not only a fantastic way to end my time as a competitor in the expo but also, thanks to Rabobank and their generous sponsorship, allowed me to embark on an international trip to Canada to further my exposure and knowledge within the industry.





I was lucky enough to spend a little over 5 weeks away in Canada at the end of last year, travelling across the providences, starting in Saskatchewan before heading to Alberta and across to British Columbia. It seems I brought the Australia summer with me with the area experiencing its first 'brown' Christmas since 1997.

I made the most of the weather and utilised the time to tour around various seed stock producers making some amazing new international connections as well as being fortunate enough to finally meet some in person after years of speaking purely online and purchasing from them in the past. RULES & REGULATIONS SHOW UNIFORM

sef: speckle PARK

A reminder to all members that the Show Uniform consists of:

- blue jeans:
- white collared dress shirt; and
- black SPI approved vest,

or as agreed by the Shed Captain at the relevant Show. The approved vest is a plain black v-neck vest with:

- the SPI logo embroidered, (embroidered vests available from SPI website); or
- a SPI logo patch affixed to a black vest (to reduce the costs for those who already have a uniform), (available on SPI website); or
- the previously available black vests with the Speckle Park wording embroidered.

If the weather requires, and the Shed Captain approved the removal of the black vest this is only permitted where the white collared dress shirt has:

- the SPI logo embroidered on the chest (embroidered shirts available from SPI website); or
- an SPI logo patch affixed to an existing shirt (to reduce the costs for those who already have a uniform), (soon available on SPI website); or
- the previously available white collared dress shirts with the Speckle Park wording embroidered.

Using Speckle Park International Selection Indexes



Selection indexes assist beef producers to make selection decisions that take into account the relevant growth, carcase, fertility and efficiency attributes of each animal to identify candidates whose progeny will be the most profitable for a particular commercial enterprise. Selection indexes provide an overall indication of an animal's genetic value for profit in a specific production system/target market and are calculated based on weightings placed on individual traits that are deemed to be important for that production system.


The weightings are calculated using <u>BreedObject</u> software that analyses all sources of costs and income for the production system represented by each selection index. As such, selection indexes account for both sides of the profit equation and reflect the short and long term profit possible through selection of superior genetics. For example, short term profit can be generated by a bull through the sale of his progeny, and the longer term profit generated by his daughters in a self-replacing cow herd.

Best Practice Guide to Animal Selection Using Speckle Park International Selection Indexes

Incorporating selection index information into breeding decisions takes the hard work out of trying to decide how much emphasis you need to put on individual EBVs when determining which animals you want to retain in your herd or purchase. The recommended strategy for selecting animals is to complete the following steps:

Identify the selection index of most relevance to your or your client's breeding objectives. This
decision should be aided by the index descriptions at the end of this document and the following
flowchart.

Which Speckle Park International Selection Index should you use?



- 2. Rank animals on the chosen selection index. This can be done via the web search facility available for the breed.
- 3. Consider the individual BREEDPLAN EBVs of importance. All breed level selection indexes are designed for the average of the production system specified in their description. This means that individual farm environments and management choices may require that their own thresholds are applied. For example, if looking for a bull to use over heifers, particular attention should be paid to Calving Ease and Birth Weight EBVs.
- 4. Consider other traits of importance. Structure, fertility (e.g. BULLCHECK[™]), temperament, genetic conditions and pedigree are all important additional considerations.

Available Speckle Park International Selection Indexes


Speckle Park International currently reports four different selection indexes. These are the:

- Domestic Maternal Index (DM)
- Domestic Terminal Index (DT)
- Export Maternal Index (EM)
- Export Terminal Index (ET)

Each selection index is reported in units of net profitability per cow mated (\$), and targets the following specifications:


Domestic Maternal Index (DM)

- Commercial herd targeting the supermarket trade.
- Selected heifers are retained so maternal traits are important.
- Steers target 475 kg live weight (260 kg HSCW & 12 mm P8 fat depth), while heifers target 450 kg (240 kg HSCW & 14 mm P8 fat depth), at 15 months of age.




Domestic Terminal Index (DT)

- Commercial herd targeting the supermarket trade.
- All progeny slaughtered at 18 months of age.
- Progeny target 450 kg live weight (290 kg HSCW & 10 mm P8 fat depth).
- Carcase quality is of importance.




Export Maternal Index (EM)

- Commercial herd targeting the export trade.
- Selected heifers are retained so maternal traits are important.
- Steers target 680 kg live weight (375 kg HSCW & 9 mm P8 fat depth) at 24 months of age.
- Carcase quality is of importance.



Export Terminal Index (ET)

- Commercial herd targeting the export trade.
- All progeny marketed at 24 months of age.
- Progeny target 550 kg live weight (300 kg HSCW & 11 mm P8 fat depth).
- Carcase quality is of importance.

RECORDING RECIPIENT FEMALES

Before registering your ET calves, you can record your recipient females on ILROnline in a matter of seconds. Please note, when recording recipient females on ILROnline, you must record the ID as it is to appear on the registry (i.e include 'R' at the end of the ID) as this is not automatically added as it is with the traditional method.

AI & ET CALVES PERMITS REQUIRED

A calf resulting from Artificial Insemination or Embryo Transfer is only eligible for registration if the sire has an AI Permit (AI) or the Dam has a Donor Dam Permit (ET) in place at the time of registration of the calf.

SPI strongly recommends intending purchasers of genetics check to confirm all necessary permits are in place to avoid potential issues. Permit status can be viewed on the online studbook.
